.... President's Message

In this time of fiscal uncertainty, many members have inquired about our benefits. I want to clarify some of those.

In regard to our Health Insurance, our primary is Medicare, if you have reached that age. Those younger still have Empire coverage and pay whatever premium you retired with (from zero to 25%). If Medicare is primary, your premium is deducted from your Social Security. By law, you must be reimbursed for Empire premiums (your secondary insurance which is deducted from your pension check), by the school district. In Half Hollow Hills those checks are sent out in June and December. This only applies to those who have Empire as their secondary coverage.

We all recently received a letter called "Notice of Creditable Coverage" from NYSHIP. The purpose of this letter is to tell you that the prescription drug coverage provided to us (through NYSHIP/Empire) is equal to or better than that provided through Medicare Part D. This letter should be saved and filed each year. It would need to be produced should you, for some reason, want to apply for Medicare part D.

In regard to concerns about our pensions, you should know that NYSTRS is one of the best public retirement systems in the nation. With assets of \$88 billion as of 9/31/08, there are sufficient funds on hand to pay promised benefits to all current retirees and to cover the accrued benefits of all active members — even those who may not collect their first payment for another 30 years. NYSTRS has both the liquidity needed to pay promised benefits today and the accumulated assets that will allow it to continue to do so in the future.

CREDITABLE COVERAGE LETTER

An important notice was sent to all retirees with medicare who are covered by NYSHIP (NY State Health Insurance Program/Empire) concerning creditable coverage requirements of the Medicare Prescription Drug Program. A copy of this twopage letter is posted on our web site http://www.hhhart.net.

It is important to hold this letter in the event you have a problem with drug coverage. Barry Corbett if you should have received this letter and did not.

In case you didn't hear about......

In a crucial victory for the American labor movement, voters in Ohio overwhelmingly rejected Senate Bill 5, the anti-union, anti-working-people bill passed earlier this year. NYSUT had more than 15 volunteers on the ground in Ohio, including ED 10 Director Tony McCann, for weeks leading up to the vote and made more than 20,000 calls for the AFL-CIO from NYSUT's polling center.

This was the first time collective bargaining was put to a vote of the people on a statewide ballot and it won by an overwhelming margin of victory in a solidly conservative state. The victory puts enemies of labor on notice that working people will not stand idle in the face of this concerted assault on union members' rights.



ticket or selling your home? The plan offers NYSUT members legal assistance for a variety of personal legal matters.


